






Centenary United Methodist Church will host a **Women's Mission Awareness Retreat** on Saturday, September 7,




Centenary Starlight Book Club

The Starlight Book Club will meet Thursday, September 19 at 6:30 PM at Lucky 32 to discuss Jodi Picoultt's <u>A Spark of Light.</u>

A powerful and provocative new novel about ordinary lives that intersect during a heart-stopping crisis.

The warm fall day starts like any other at the Center—a women's reproductive health services clinic



—its staff offering care to anyone who passes through its doors. Then, in late morning, a desperate and distraught gunman bursts in and opens fire, taking all inside hostage.

After rushing to the scene, Hugh McElroy, a police hostage negotiator, sets up a perimeter and begins making a plan to communicate with the gunman. As his phone vibrates with incoming text messages he glances at it and, to his horror, finds out that his fifteen-year-old daughter, Wren, is inside the clinic.

But Wren is not alone. She will share the next and tensest few hours of her young life with a cast of unforgettable characters: A nurse who calms her own panic in order save the life of a wounded woman. A doctor who does his work not in spite of his faith but because of it, and who will find that faith tested as never before. A pro-life protester disguised as a patient, who now stands in the cross hairs of the same rage she herself has felt. A young woman who has come to terminate her pregnancy. And the disturbed individual himself, vowing to be heard.

Told in a daring and enthralling narrative structure that counts backward through the hours of the standoff, this is a story that traces its way back to what brought each of these very different individuals to the same place on this fateful day.

Jodi Picoult—one of the most fearless writers of our time—tackles a complicated issue in this gripping and nuanced novel. How do we balance the rights of pregnant women with the rights of the unborn they carry? What does it mean to be a good parent? A Spark of Light will inspire debate, conversation . . . and, hopefully, understanding.

Centenary's annual Mother's Day Plant Sale benefiting Habitat for Humanity Greensboro celebrated is't 29th year this past Mother's Day weekend! George and Estelle Cranford came up with the idea while visiting another church plant sale 30 years ago, and the rest is history. Over the past 29 years the sale has raised over \$130,000 for Habitat Greensboro! While volunteering at this year's sale, habitat Board member Joy Brown was so moved by the Cranford's and Centenary's dedication to this long standing support of Habitat that she decided to honor them through Habitat's recently launched Adopt-A-Lot campaign. In an effort to help cover the cost of land for each new Habitat home, Habitat is asking donors to consider "Adopting A Lot" for \$10,000. Once Joy found out the proceeds from this year's sale were \$4,194 she made an additional gift of \$5,806 to bring the total to \$10,000 to designate an "Adopt-A-Lot" in honor of the Cranfords and Centenary UMC. Please join us to celebrate the Cranfords, our church and all who have helped contribute to the success of the plant sale over the past 29 years at a church service this fall. The date is yet to be determined.

From the very beginning the Cranfords decided the proceeds from the sale should support a community non-profit and together with Centenary's missions team they chose Habitat for Humanity of Greensboro. Centenary church members have faithfully supported the sale with countless loyal volunteers over the years who help set up the tents, water the plants, assist customers, cook hotdogs and burgers, and do whatever it takes to make the plant sale a huge success. Each year, they see so many repeat customers who look forward to the sale and often come back 2-3 times during the sale to purchase more plants for their gardens. The Smith Family who own Mendenhill Farms has been supplying all the plants on consignment for the past 26 years and have been instrumental to the success of the sale as well.

George has only missed working at one plant sale due to surgery, and Estelle has been at every sale to share her expertise and love of all things that bloom and grow with the customers. Estelle says she especially loves interacting with all the people and George enjoys adding up each customer's purchases (always in his head, NEVER with a calculator!) and conversing with everyone. Attending Habitat home dedications has always been a highlight for the Cranfords as they see the fruit of all the work that goes into the plant sale become a blessing of stability and hope for a family who is able to purchase an affordable home. We look forward to the 30th Annual Plant Sale next Mother's Day weekend!

October 13 Made at Centenary: The Ultimate in Locally-Sourced Music

James Esterline, pianist

Accessible music written at the very piano on which it will be played, this program consists of salon miniatures – preludes, valsettes, mazurkas, and the like – along with some esoteric takes on hymn tunes and a few substantial variation sets. A couple of transcriptions round out this traversal of the composer's works.

An alumnus of the Eastern Music Festival, James Esterline studied piano performance under George Kiorpes of UNC Greensboro in the course of obtaining his bachelor's degree in music, mathematics, and physics from Guilford College, before going on to complete doctoral study in nuclear physics at Duke University. Performing regularly both as soloist and accompanist, James serves as music director at Browns Summit United Methodist Church; he also teaches piano, privately in the Triad and the Triangle, and at Harmony Music School, a free lesson program for underprivileged children in southwestern Greensboro.

October 27 Music for a Great Cause: A Philharmonia of Greensboro benefit concert Members of the Philharmonia of Greensboro

Members of the civic orchestra of Greensboro present a varied program of small-ensemble music and solos, ranging from Mozart violin sonatas and Chinese fantasies for harp to Klezmer bassoon quartets and contemporary Bostonian music for woodwind trio. Come and be enlightened – and entertained!

Founded in 1978 as the Greensboro Civic Orchestra, the Philharmonia of Greensboro is a program of The Music Center of City Arts (the visual and performing arts division of the City of Greensboro Parks & Recreation Department); operating under the direction of Peter Perret, it is a volunteer group of orchestral musicians, both non-professional and professional. There are approximately sixty members in the ensemble made up of strings, woodwind, brass, and percussion players. The Philharmonia performs between three and six concerts a season, including regular appearances in the OPUS and MUSEP concert series. The Philharmonia always welcomes new members!

November 3 Treasures Unearthed: An Airing of Forgotten Wind Quintets

Cambiata Winds: Nancy Thurston, flute; Susan Kundert, oboe; John Walker, clarinet; Mary Sylvester, French horn; Caroline Shogry, bassoon with James Esterline, pianist

Cambiata Winds makes its second full Centenary Community Concerts appearance with another work (this time a wind quintet) by the long-overlooked German late-Romantic composer Theodor Blumer, as well as an arrangement of Debussy's *Petite Suite* for wind quintet. As a bonus, interposed between the two: the barnstorming Chopin of his *Grande Polonaise brillante*.

"Cambiata" is the word that indicates a changing voice. We are a classical woodwind quintet – at least, that's where we start. But we change our instrumental voices to suit the occasion, enabling us to play a wide range of literature for a variety of occasions!

November 10 Music for a Great Cause: A Harmony Music School benefit concert Teachers and Students of Harmony Music School

We close our 2019 concert season with the consistent cuteness overload that is Harmony Music School's young students in performance; they will be joined by their teachers presenting a variety of styles ranging from classical to folk rock. Come and support the ministry in music that is Harmony's free lesson program!

Founded by local musician and music advocate Lyn Koonce, Harmony Music School is a non-profit, volunteer-based program based at Hinshaw United Methodist Church that provides free music instruction and instruments to children otherwise without access to the resources necessary to learn a musical instrument.
