The Centenarian

From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Centenary UMC,

Lent is such an important part of the Christian journey. It is a time set apart to read, reflect, and prepare. As members of the United Methodist Denomination, we have time of preparation with Advent. We prepare our hearts for the birth of the Christ Child. Advent is an exciting, happy event, and truly celebrated by people of all ages. Lent is considered a different journey. It consists of 46 days in all – around 7 weeks. Lent leads us to the most affirming event of the Christian faith – the resurrection of Jesus Christ; however, we must face the cruelty of the cross, as well as the darkness of our failure and sin, before the celebration of forgiveness and hope which Christ instills within us on Easter.

This month of March is all about the walk toward the cross with both the valleys and hills, the mountains and deserts. I pray that we are doing something intentional that is different from our ordinary routine, in order to deepen our relationship with Christ.

As Leonard Sweet states, "Lent started early this year. With the east coast up to its eyebrows in snow, the Lenten season was underway. Sweet stated that he only learned recently that every year Fat Tuesday comes to an abrupt end at midnight. This year, New Orleans police shut down the Mardi Gras festivities promptly at 12 am in reverence for Ash Wednesday. This is when people began giving up something for Lent. Some gave up meat. Others gave up sweets, or alcohol, or television. If you want to face a real Lenten challenge, try giving up your cell phone for forty days! That might be enough to get you into a true Lenten mood." Preacher Kimberly Long tells this story at the beginning of one of her Lenten sermons. Entering church on Ash Wednesday, Nora Gallagher encounters—Anne's giving up drinking, Terri's giving up chocolate, and I'm just giving up. Sweet reflects, —Have you ever felt like giving up?"

Lent asks us to make the choice to sacrifice – to give up self to Christ. Jesus certainly gave up a lot for each of us. He gave us himself. He made the journey to Jerusalem and met head on the traumatic tradition of that city encapsulated in this phrase —Jerusalem, the city that kills the prophets and stones those who are sent to it. Jesus will give up everything, his very life, in order to fulfill his eternal mission of salvation. Let me put it as clearly as I can: Jesus will —give it up in order that we might —get it all.

This is my prayer for you this Lenten season – give up your power, your control, your desire in order to receive all the assurance, the promises, and the hopes of Jesus the Christ.

Leonard Sweet says to —give up on a career that is taking out your soul, give up on that relationship that is debilitating or deforming or dementing you, give up on a grudge that is gouging out a cavity in your heart, give up on an addictive escape - be it drugs, alcohol, sex, power, speed, beauty, or authority and find renewed meaning and purpose in reality.

Jesus did not give up his own safety, security, and self-preservation, but he did give up to God's divine plan for salvation.

During this Lent - Are you giving up or taking on? Will you give up the sacred sense of



We briefly lived in Franklin, but moved back to our home in Hendersonville...giving us more access to Drs. and music venues. Two of our children, their spouses and 4 grand-children are near by. Our other two children are in Wilmington and Hawaii with their spouses and 3 of our grandchildren. We see all of them as often as we can.

Gail was diagnosed with Trigeminal Neurology and MS in 2014 which explained symptoms she had had for many years. She is responding well to the medicines prescribed.

I have had another small stroke and various transient medical issues.

Since becoming disabled, (2010), I have been in Physical therapy regularly, and I found that I could use my music to get my fingers and brain working again. There are many open mic opportunities in Asheville, and I have created 8 albums on cdbaby. 
